





traveling and capturing some excellent work. She was one of those army of competent photographers who has collected an impressive body of work and had little or no recognition for what she had done. The collection was both film and digital. She is long since gone and I didn't know her family but I often wonder what happened to her work.

I'm reminded of the late, reclusive street photographer, Vivian Maier. She was a nanny and spent her free time capturing images around Chicago in the 50's. Decades after her death her prints, negatives and even undeveloped film were discovered. Nothing had ever been published and her work became a modernday treasure drove.

I can't say which of these fates awaits any of us but it is a sobering contrast of fading into oblivion or becoming part of photo history.

However, family photographs can have incredible personal value and year after year we hear stories of people who saved their family albums (or lost them) during disasters. On another note, I hear of people who uncover boxes of old photographs when cleaning out storage areas of elder family members and none of these photographs have any notations identifying the subjects! These anonymous photographs are worthless unless you are lucky enough to have family members that have other photographs to compare faces or living family members who can identify the subjects.

I found that one of the great benefits of digital images is that it forced me to be organized. I have to put my images in a folder and that folder must be labeled if I ever hope to find them again. Of course, the greatest value comes with key wording each image, a practice I am woefully lax at completing – most of the time.

With billions of garbage images floating on the internet we tend to attach less importance to our own collections. That's a dangerous mindset. It's extremely important that you take the time to truly assess your personal photo collection.

I urge everyone to assemble a portfolio of greatest images and properly label all of those images. Many of you have websites and that's a nice option and it's a good way to proceed but other photographers don't want to bother with a website. At the very least start assembling a 'favorites" portfolio. It may never be viewed online but it is still a way of archiving those nuggets of photographic excellence that can be discovered by future generations of family that will not have to dig through hundreds of thousands of mediocre images that only have nostalgic value for you.

This "favorites" folder has another very useful purpose. It gives you an opportunity to continue to review your work over the years and you may find certain images in need of pruning as your photographic skills and self-critiquing improve. You will also find certain images that continue to survive the test of time. Who knows, maybe you collection will turn you into the next Vivian Maier.
