
MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



CONGRATULATIONS TO GEORGE LEPP



Photographer, educator, writer and mentor George D. Lepp will receive NANPA's Lifetime Achievement Award at the 2019 Nature Photography Summit and Trade Show, February 21-23 in Las Vegas, NV.

To nature photographers and his long-time fans, Lepp needs no introduction. As the awards committee noted, he is "one of North America's best-known contemporary outdoor and nature photographers. His passions for natural beauty, technical precision, cutting-edge technology, and environmental responsibility are revealed in his beautiful and compelling photographic images. He is also widely recognized for his unique dedication to sharing his photographic and biological knowledge with other photographers through his seminars and writing. In both realms, George Lepp is a leader in the rapidly advancing field of digital imaging."

First trained in wildlife and wild lands management, George Lepp later earned a BPA and honorary MS in Professional Photography from Brooks Institute. George is a columnist and field editor for Outdoor Photographer and, with his wife Kathryn Vincent Lepp, is the author of many articles and

books. He is a Canon Explorer of Light and a founding board member of NANPA. George and Kathryn, a writer and editor herself, live in Bend, Oregon.

ANOTHER VIEW by ROBERT AGLI

NAVY SEALS AND PHOTOGRAPHERS – A GREAT DEAL IN COMMON

I recently met a retired Navy Commander who spent his career as a Navy SEAL. He arrived for one of my photography classes at COCC a half hour early. That's not an uncommon practice for these guys because they are taught if you arrive on time you are late.

His gear was neatly stowed, his manuals were in sealed bags and he had writing materials and an iPad for taking notes. In military parlance he was what is called squared away.

Before someone takes offense let me clarify that I am well aware that SEALs face extreme circumstances to accomplish their mission and most of us, as photographers, could not ever fathom what they go through. Nevertheless, as photographers we can learn a great deal from these "Quiet Professionals".

SEALs never stop training. Classrooms, manuals and hands-on are all part of the drill. They are constantly improving their skills through practice. As photog-

raphers we should also be studying and practicing. There is an infinite source of training material via classes, workshops, videos, and books available to us and practice can be as simple as fooling with your camera or gear while watching TV.

SEALs are expert with all of their equipment. Every piece of gear they use is like an extension of their body. Furthermore they take excellent care of their gear and they make certain everything is in working order. You can't focus on the mission if you have equipment problems caused by lack of familiarity or equipment failure. The parallels are uncanny. We have had people in our photo workshops that make you wonder how they ever get a shot. They are so caught up with unraveling themselves from their gear that their actual photo time is a fraction of the workshop experience.

SEALs understand that planning is the key to successful completion of the mission and every operation is rehearsed before they deploy. But these people understand that no matter how well you plan things happen and they are world class problem solvers. Any photo project requires a level of planning and an understanding that things probably will not go as planned. Problem solving is the difference between successful photographers and everyone else.

Debriefing is also an important component of any operation. It's vital to understand what went right and what could be improved. A formal critique process is always a valuable debrief but even more important is a self-critique process where you realistically analyze your work and not only recognize areas that need improvement but to also pat yourself on the back for things that are well done.

It's been at least 50 years since my Navy days but the first two principles of Navy leadership still rattle around in my head. The first principle was accomplish the mission and the second principle was to know your men and look out for their welfare. That may seem contradictory but if you think about it number one can't happen without number two. It isn't too much of a stretch to think in terms of your number one photographic principle – get the shot and if you don't know the subject whether it's a portrait or a landscape you are not going to get a great shot.

And one final comment, nobody asks a SEAL how many shots it took to accomplish the mission. The same applies for photography. It's not how many shots you take, it's did you get the shot?
