



#### THE #1 PHOTO KILLER

Jay Maisel, the great New York street photographer, said that "you can get much better photographs if you remember to bring a camera". His tongue in cheek advice on being prepared is, indeed, noteworthy. However, it addresses the individual who is already out there shooting. A far more lethal killer of shots is never being there in the first place and the root cause is procrastination. This insidious condition takes many forms from just good old lack of planning to the blue funk.

I wonder how many folks actually thought to themselves how nice it would be to get out after "the big snow" and shoot a few frames and then immediately lapsed into compiling a whole list of things they should do before committing time to photography.

We can all relate to the blue funk. It hits us all. There are days when just breathing is the extent of effort we want to expend.

My two favorite procrastination syndromes are "it's not perfect conditions day" or the other beauty is "I'm afraid I don't know enough to take the perfect image". I'm sure if I polled the membership of our club we could amass an additional incredible list of excuses of why your camera is no more than a dust collector.

I'm equally guilty and, as a world class procrastinator, I can offer you some suggestions that have worked for me in my ongoing battle with inertness. Here are a few suggestions:

- 1. Cultivate friends who have a passion for photography. If you have a list of folks who can call you or you can call then peer pressure will overwhelm procrastination.
- 2. Keep your equipment ready to shoot. My editorial shooting forced me to have a "go bag" (photo editors are notoriously last minute planners). All my essential gear is in one bag I call the mother ship. It's a honker but it has 95% of anything I could possibly need. I can grab that bag, and an empty bag and my tripod and I am ready to go. Many times I would get to the shoot and I could just operate out of my vehicle. If I'm in for a hike I figure out what I need and stick it in the smaller bag. Quite frankly, it takes me longer to lace up my boots than it does to organize my gear. The message here is have your gear ready!
- 3. Commit time every week to photography. Don't wait for the perfect light or the perfect situation. It will never happen. Those things happen to the person out there shooting not those waiting for the day.
- 4. The great shot comes as the result of a lot of photography. And the perfect shot does not exist. It's the holy grail of photography. Decades ago when my pre-teen concert pianist daughter was practicing with an ensemble I asked her how they can stay motivated doing the same music over and over again. She had a shocked looked and said, "Wow, you don't get it. Any time we get close to perfect it's such an incredible high it motivates us to keep trying and we also know if we do poorly we can do a lot better." Kids say the darnedest things but maybe it should be the mantra of all photographers.
