CITY HALL EXHIBIT

Theme: FACES AND PLACES OF BEND HOSTED BY BEND'S ARTS, BEAUTIFICATION & CULTURE COMISSION DEADLINE TO SUBMIT DIGITAL THUMBNAILS FOR CONSIDERATION - Monday APRIL 14TH IF SELECTED, THE PREPARED PRINT NEEDS TO BE AT CITY HALL BEFORE APRIL 28TH.

Our club has been invited to create a juried Photography Exhibit to hang at Bend City Hall. The theme as mentioned above is FACES AND PLACES OF BEND. Wendy Caro (wendy@wendycaro.com) will head up the CCC Committee to oversee the exhibit. Please email, her a thumbnail (sized as we size submissions for critique night) for a maximum of 2 digital files for consideration, no later than 7pm, Monday April14th, 2014. Please send email as an attached file, don't embed it in the body of the email. You will be notified by April 19th if an image has been selected. You don't have to go to the trouble of printing/framing an image until you know if yours has been selected. If selected, your prepared print needs to be delivered to City Hall by April 28th, ready to hang. Canvas prints are acceptable, we're currently checking to see if metal prints would be considered. All submissions final, no submission exchanges will be accepted.

- Size: A framed minimum of 16" x 20" and a framed maximum of 36" x 48".
- **Medium:** Color is preferred, but we are open to ideas and suggestions. If any prints would be presented on canvas, we would request that they are wrapped and the staples secured from the reverse and not showing.
- **Presentation**: If we could have them ready to hang with secure supporting wire, or if a bracket is used, to have the eye level hang taken into consideration.
- Dates: The thumbnail needs to get to Wendy by April 12th, then the finished image would need to be dropped off at City Hall before April 28, 2014. The show would hang for 5 months, until September 28, 2014.
- Subject: Unique, special and creative images of Bend and/or its people, animals and visitors, and hopefully images that have not been shown previously in Bend.
- Opening: Friday, May 2 at 5:30 p.m. City Hall. We would request the artists to be in attendance and available to talk with visitors and speak about their work.
- Sales: 100% of the proceeds from any sales will be retained by the artists. Neither the City of Bend nor the ABC Commission would take any commission.

Stupid Mistakes We Continue to Make (the sequel)

My camera bit me! OK, it didn't really bite me, it was more the operator of the camera did not follow his own advice. I repeatedly preach to those in my classes to always, always zero your camera prior to beginning a shoot. I'm going to blame it on several 15 hour work days but I walked off for a mountain shoot with the exposure bracketing still set on a 7

frame auto setting. This is not a good thing when you are shooting hundreds of frames for a time-lapse project.

For those of you unfamiliar with the term "zeroing your camera" it means to always check that your camera is dialed in to a standard group of settings that provide a familiar starting point before shooting. In my case I want to check that the Mode is set on Aperture Priority, the Quality is set to RAW, the ISO is on 100, the White Balance is Daylight, the frame rate is single frame, Exposure Compensation is 0, Auto Bracketing is 0, there is a newly formatted card or cards in the camera and that the battery is fully charged. Of course I am going to change those settings but by starting from a known set of standards I at least know the problems I am trying to resolve are not caused by some weird setting.

I'm going to blame having come off several 15-hour workdays but the fact remains I violated a sacrosanct rule and my camera bit me. Maybe I should never have gotten out of bed because I also dragged out my 200-400mm lens to take with me. This thing is packed in it's own padded carrying bag that's about as big as a golf club bag! Well maybe that's a little exaggeration but you get the picture. I managed to not see it and walked out of the house without it.

There was a sign up over the door to the ready room of our flight training school in the Navy. It said a "midair collision spoils your whole day". I'm very thankful that I am now doing something that lets me continue to learn from my mistakes. The point being that photography is indeed a very complex process and mistakes do happen. I try to put processes in place that reduce the chance of making mistakes but I'm still going to occasionally get bit.

My wife highly recommended I compose a checklist for my Patagonia adventure after I proclaimed that everything I needed I had committed to memory. I didn't want to face another "I told you" so I wrote up a list with 2 columns. One list was personal effects and the other was camera gear. You know where this is going. I started the list a month before going and added to my original list, the one carried in my head, by at least twofold. And then I applied that age-old rule of travel and reduced my apparel list by one half and doubled the cash I was carry-

ing. I'm pleased to report that I used every piece of camera gear (and clothing) and forgot nothing.

Maybe there is some value to this list thing. I am starting to become a convert. So let me begin with a small list of advice for you...

- Always, always zero out your camera before beginning a shoot
- Develop checklists particularly for travel or important projects
- If you meet a professional photographer (or amateur) who says he/she doesn't make mistakes you are talking to a liar. Mark them for zero creditability.

And most importantly remember the immortal words of the late, profoundly enlightened contemporary philosopher, Roseanne Roseannadana, who said, "If it ain't one thing it's another".

In Memorium Brian Ellis

Brian Campbell Ellis, 74, a resident of Baraboo, passed away on Feb. 22 at St. Clare Hospice House after a valiant and courageous battle against cancer.

Brian was born Nov. 18, 1939, in Washington, D.C., the only child of Frank and Marie Ellis. After his family's move to Florida, he graduated from the University of Florida in Gainesville, where he was a member of Chi Phi fraternity and from which he received his B.A. degree in 1961. He went on to graduate second in his class from the University of Florida School of Law in 1965, where he also served as editor of the school's Law Review. He was also captain of the moot court team there, which placed first in statewide competition and went on to win the award for best brief at the national competitions that year. He was a member of Florida Blue Key Honor Society. After graduation from the University of Florida School of Law, he continued his legal studies at New York University School of Law, where he received his L.L.M., or Masters in Taxation Law, degree in 1966.

He practiced law in Tampa for more than 30 years as a tax attorney and partner in the two law firms of Holland & Knight and Fowler, White, Gillen, Boggs, Villareal & Banker, L.L.P.

He had two children: a daughter, Elizabeth Marie, and a son, Christopher Campbell.

During retirement, his lifelong passion for photography blossomed. After a move to Bend, Ore. with his wife Sandy, he served as vice president and then president of the Cascade Camera Club in Bend. His photography, which focused on landscapes and architecture, was exhibited both in Tampa and Bend.

Brian's love of animals and commitment to their well-being spanned his entire life. He was an active and vocal advocate against factory farming and greyhound racing. In Tampa, he was a member of an organization that successfully fought for the passage of a law requiring humane crate sizes for gestating pigs. His children recall many a road trip interrupted when Brian pulled over to the side of the road to rescue an animal that had wandered into traffic. He cared for countless pets over his lifetime, many of which had been homeless or abused before he adopted them.

Brian was also an avid reader, golfer, downhill skier and hiker. He was a die-hard fan of the University of Florida Gators, and was a lifelong Porsche 911 driver and enthusiast.

He is survived by his wife, Sandra Ellis, of Baraboo; daughter, Elizabeth Ellis Mottur and son-in-law Alfred Mottur, both of Chevy Chase, Md.; son, Christopher Campbell Ellis of Los Angeles; step-son, Herbert Spradlin and daughter-in-law, Cynthia Spradlin of Merrimac, and grandchildren, Thomas, Caroline, and Theodore Mottur of Chevy Chase, Md.; and grandchildren, Walker Spradlin of Merrimac and Danielle Spradlin of Middleton.



If so inclined, Brian's family would enjoy receiving notes from those who knew him. There's no format, but memories of him, be it a fuuny story or a photo trip experience shared, would be much appreciated.
