



I just had a client who wanted me to photograph a framed portrait without removing the glass. How I photographed it without reflections is a tale for another time but the finished product was spot on when

I viewed it on my monitor. I attached a copy and sent it to the client. That was a bad idea. She in turn showed it to the artist who said the skin tones where too red. After I recovered from the shock I realized I have no idea what kind of monitor she was using and there was little chance it was calibrated. I invited her to look at the image on my monitor and she agreed it was on the money.

I know my monitor is accurate because it is calibrated for both color and brightness using a calibration device called a photo spectrometer. It's a fancier version of the colorimeters every serious photographer should be using.

Manually calibrating just isn't going to cut it for 99% of photographers. And you most certainly cannot eyeball brightness levels. Every photo lab, graphics department and other image intensive business calibrates. These are people making their living adjusting color but if they don't start from a known standard there is no one in the world who will be able to replicate their work.

Paper and printer manufacturers absolutely love those people who eschew calibration. It means you are going to go through a ton of paper and ink to get what you want. It also means you are not going to be happy with the results of high-end labs who print what you send them.

During our monthly exhibition night when I hear the words "it doesn't look like that on my monitor at home" I know the image has been edited on a machine that was not calibrated and/or was displayed on a poor quality monitor.

It's amazing that people are willing to spend thousands of dollars on cameras and lenses and ignore the one device that can totally ruin whatever effort you spent capturing an image.

Here are some basic realities in the world of displaying color:

#1 Virtually every new Mac monitor has excellent color rendition but I can guarantee the brightness (luminance) is too high.

#2 Every PC is capable of great color rendition when properly calibrated and coupled with a decent monitor.

#3 You don't have to spend a fortune for a good quality monitor but you need to do some research and \$200 isn't going to get what you need.

#4 The club has a good quality colorimeter available on loan. There is no excuse for not calibrating. Call Jim Sellers if you want to borrow it. His contact information is available in this newsletter.

#5 The correct luminance for new LCD/LED monitors is 120 cd/m2. If you don't know what I am talking about it's time to do a little research.

Caution About Lyme Disease

In reading the October, 2015 copy of Outdoor Photographer, I noticed on page 53 that the Author of "Autumn in the American Midwest", Tom Till, made the following comment:

"The main danger outdoors is ticks. Lyme disease is spreading, and even though nights might be freezing, ticks can still be active. Also a new tick-borne disease was recently found in Missouri and is very dangerous. Check yourself carefully after outings, dress to prevent bites, and use repellant."

I recently moved to Bend from Pennsylvania where Lyme disease and other tick borne disease is prevalent. I am told that it has arrived in Oregon, especially west of the Cascades and anywhere where there is enough water to support tall grass and underbrush including the Cascade Lakes region. It is unlikely that you will find it in the high desert except in river and stream valleys. I urge my fellow CCC members to take this threat seriously - I was bitten by an infected tick but did not know it. I experienced cardiac effects as well as symptoms related to the central nervous system which required over five years of intensive and expensive antibiotic treatment. An ounce of prevention is potentially worth years of suffering and treatment. James Dunn

APPLE USERS ALERT

Word of caution for Apple users, Victoria Bampton just sent out a warning for Mac users only who are downloading Adobe's latest update. You may not be able to open Lightroom after downloading this latest update. Lightroom will tell you the permissions are incorrect. There is a patch and it is relatively simple to install for those with moderate to high geek skills. You may want to just wait for Adobe to provide a revised update before doing anything.
