ANOTHER VIEW by ROBERT AGLI

I LIKE IT!

I like it. Three little words that may inflate your ego but provide little input from the person uttering these words on the quality of your photographic work. Most of us are reluctant to respond with

Tutorials for uploading digital images can be found on our website Cascadecameraclub.org "thank you but why do you like it?" In our polite society we rarely hear "I don't like it". Proclaiming displeasure can have equal and perhaps even greater value than liking a piece of work. Here is an example of liking a work...

At the recent Art on the River exhibit I purchased a graphite pencil drawing by a fantastic artist named David Bjurstrom. This is a big deal as I rarely give up space in my home to other artists. You can count them on one hand. I have admired his work for years and finally decided to bite the bullet. I "like" his work, all of it. I selected a drawing he titled "Happy Hour" showing 5 zebras drinking at a water hole. I think most of us have seen hundreds of images of zebras at water holes so what's the big deal? I don't have a particular penchant for zebras so simply stating "I like it" hardly explains what drew me to select this particular piece.

When I first laid eyes on this drawing I was blown away by the graphic impact. The bone white background contrasting with the stripes of the zebra emotionally sucked me in. This drawing could easily pass as a black and white photograph. The attention to detail rivaled high resolution photo prints. The mastery of line, and gradations of tonality are

incredible. As a composition it is simple and yet incredibly complex. Yup, I like it.

Did I explain this to the artist when I purchased the drawing? You bet! Of course it wasn't exactly the same words but I did talk about the graphic nature, incredible detail, etc. etc.

Simply stating "I like it" has little value to either you the viewer or the creator. As a photographer you really need to analyze and explain to yourself what is appealing. If you really discipline yourself to do this you will find it far easier to start explaining to others why something appeals to you.

Don't worry about being right or wrong. It's your opinion and your opinion need not match others. I absolutely loathe the use of rosemary in bread. It tastes like someone accidentally dumped perfume into the dough. That's my opinion and if others enjoy the taste so be it.

But the real value in articulating your thoughts about all art is that overtime it will make you an increasingly better photographer. You will find yourself more clearly seeing the subtleties of a composition. The camera is a tool to capture your vision but first you need the vision.
