

Since 2002, Oregon-based freelance photographer and outdoorsman Jonathan Kingston has been traveling the globe collecting images of the natural world and capturing vistas of life lived on the edge. From arresting images of vibrant tribal dances to underwater vistas of elephants swimming at sea to silhouettes of climbers scaling rock cast against a crepuscular sky, Kingston's penchant for itinerancy and a love of the wild have taken him to some of the most remote and unmapped corners of the world. His work has appeared in print and online publications including National Geographic, Geo Saison, The New York Times, The New Yorker and The Wall Street Journal, and has received honors from the prestigious Communication Arts and PDN Photo Annual competitions.

ANOTHER VIEW by ROBERT AGLI

THE ART OF STEALING

I confess this is actually about the creative process but the art of stealing is a lot more compelling title than understanding the creative process. Most of us are under the mistaken impression that the formation of a new idea just suddenly pops into our head often times characterized by a light bulb like illumination. Unfortunately, that's a rare occurrence that's typically born out of the desire to improve something. A case in point is what Steve Jobs did for the desktop computer. Jobs didn't invent it he refined it in a way that anyone could easily use it. A friendly graphics user interface was a huge step in catapulting personal computing into everyone's home assisted by Microsoft piggy backing off of that idea.

You can apply this same process to your photography. Photographing the same scene from the same tripod holes as a thousand other people may be considered an accomplishment by some photographers, I think it's mind numbingly boring. You should always be thinking how can I make this scene mine? What can I do differently? How can I use this shot to inspire me to improve.

Some time ago I was paging through a photo magazine and saw a remarkable image of a grizzled character sitting in his junk-yard shop. I loved the lighting, the expression on the guy's face and the environment. I immediately thought of my good friend Brent. The resemblance was only the beard and the fact that Brent's property looks like a place that Juniper trees go to die. It's a cornucopia of photo ops. We set up at least a half dozen different environmental portraits with probably a hundred more good ideas yet to be explored. As a result, I have some really killer portraits but the story doesn't end there. Brent showed the images to his friend Ben Canales, one of the top photographers in the Northwest. The shots inspired Ben and he took one of the concepts and expanded on it for his own version. This is the art of stealing at its finest and I'm thrilled that someone was inspired by the work we did. (You can see these 3 images below- junkyard guy, my image is the warm white balance, Ben has the cool white balance)

My first thought when I see an image that really moves me (and after I get over a brief episode of envy) is how can I take that image and make it my own. Are there things I don't like? Is there a better time of day or season? What are the myriad of ways

I can apply what I see to my own work? The real creative process is expanding on the work of others to create your own vision.

Video – expanding your vision

I was really disappointed in the lack of submissions for our video program night although I can understand the lack of enthusiasm. It does, God forbid, take work! It's difficult to just put a toe in the water to test out video production. It really does at least call for you to roll up your trousers and wade out in the water. My "submersion" came about through dabbling with GoPros and drones. What I have learned is that video gives you a totally different perspective of the world around you and an opportunity to tell a story in a manner that a single frame cannot. However, one of the side benefits of shooting 4K video is that each frame has enough information that you can grab a single frame for use as a still image with very good resolution. Think of it as a still camera with a motor drive capturing 30 frames a second.
