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Welcome to *IN FOCUS*, newsletter of the Cascade Camera Club, located in Bend, Oregon.



# **FOCUS FRUSTRATION**

Our camera systems have become incredibly sophisticated and with that comes confusion and frustration. Leading the pack in the litany of frustrations are focusing options. Manufacturers have managed to even further complicate this issue using their obtuse form of explaining the myriad of focusing options. Only a handful of dedicated experts have any idea what they do or how to use them. For example, several friends have recommended an e-book by Steve Perry on the Nikon focusing system. Perry has made a decent attempt at unraveling the mystery of auto focus but it took over 300 pages to do it! Of course, it does cover all current models but thankfully about 75% of the functions are similar. The choices of what works best becomes so overwhelming that I wager even the most dedicated photographers simply give up and go with one or two methods that seem to work in the field. There is nothing more bewildering than trying to sort out an autofocus problem in the middle of a shoot.

Tutorials for uploading digital images can be found on our website Cascadecameraclub.org Unfortunately, the focus conundrum fits hand in glove with the other greater photographic mystery, depth of field. If you don't truly understand depth of field autofocus instruction may well be no more enlightening than quantum physics.

Let's see if we can shed some light on this incredibly complex subject. First thing to consider is that in the world of optics the laws of physics prevail. Your lens regardless of cost, number of elements and all the marketing hype in the world can only sharply focus on a single point or focusing plane. Think of an invisible wall that varies in thickness and you have a good visual cue about depth of field. What we speak of as shallow or increased depth of field (the thickness of the wall) is that area in front and in back of the actual focus point that seems to be sharp. This front and back area can be pretty close, in terms of sharpness, with the actual plane of the focus point. However, what we think of as sharp focus only has a single plane within the depth of field that is truly sharp and everything else within the depth of field is almost sharp and a lot better than those areas outside the plane of focus. Whew!

What that means for you as a photographer is that all those choices in your menu are meant to provide an optimum way of using that single point of focus. At a very minimum, any camera worthy of its name can focus on a single static point and by selecting a menu option can focus on moving subjects by locking on the subject and can even predict where the subject will be when the shutter opens again after taking one or more images. That's rather nifty and it works surprisingly well under most conditions. Manufacturers have provided a series of grids that allow you to move or automatically move your focusing point. These grids number anywhere from about 9 to 60 points. That DOES NOT mean, for example, that all 9 points are in focus at different depths. It does mean that one of the 9 points highlighted is in focus and you or the camera can select that point.

The thing to remember about all of the choices is that they are meant to provide you with a variety of ways to quickly and accurately determine the best spot for your point of focus. Depth of field plays a huge role in what is considered in focus.

We are not quite done with the complexity issues. Your lens and/ or camera may not be in Sympatico due to manufacturer's tolerance or some damage caused by dropping one or both. This can result in your autofocus causing back or front focus. There are devices made to check this alignment and most of the higher end model cameras allow you to set a plus or minus factor for each lens and save those values. The club has a Lens Align tool as a loaner for members and Nikon has a built-in lens calibration tool in their higher end cameras. A word of warning... all these methods are tedious, time consuming and technical and must be performed with each lens used on each camera you own! It's a daunting proposition and in the end, may not produce much of a difference.

Soft focus is one of the most common problems for a substandard image. The starting point of overcoming focusing problems is to first master good shooting technique. Once those principles are mastered you need to truly become one with your camera. That can only happen through frequent use and an ongoing commitment to learning all you can about your camera. Understanding all of the autofocus options will take time and effort and trial and error. I doubt the journey to master this hugely complex device will ever end but that's the fun...
