














Soichiro Honda and the 4 Whys

I only met him once and I believe he was already in his 80's but Soichiro Honda made the energizer bunny look like a geriatric patient. The day I met him he had just received a huge crystal award. He hoisted it over his head like a prize fighter who had just won a championship. His entourage was terrified he would drop it and you could see he delighted in teasing them.

I spent a couple of decades at American Honda and the business principles that Honda-san imbued on the company was indeed a guiding light in a corporate sea of darkness but that's a story for another day.

As an engineer, Honda embraced a street savvy methodology to problem solving. First off, production problem solving did not get done in the boardroom and for that matter almost all problems could not be resolved in the boardroom. If you wanted to problem solve you went to the source and then you asked the 4 Why's. The ensuing dialogue usually entailed going to people on the line and asking what do you think the problem is? And with every answer would come his next question why do you think that is? It was astounding how well the process worked. Of course, production problems were rather black and white. Did the process work in less tangible circumstances. A surprising amount of time it did.

Ok photographers that's the hook. Why are you a photographer? Let's play that out with a hypothetical club member.

Question: "Why are you a photographer?"

Answer: "It's something I enjoy doing."

Question: "Why do you enjoy doing it?"

Answer: "Hum, I never thought about it. I think it's the challenge."

Question: "Why is it a challenge?"

Answer: "It's a rather complicated process. You need to understand, light and composition and technique and then you need to understand your gear and even all that computer stuff."

Question: "Why go through the complicated process?"

Answer: "I guess there is a sense of joy in the accomplishment and it's a pretty individual accomplishment that not everyone can do. It's something where I can take ownership and no one will ever have exactly the same take on an image that I did."
