
Beyond Stillness: The Dynamic World of Bird in Flight Photography

Exceptional action photography seizes a transient moment, encapsulating both grace and vigor. In this presentation, I'll share the insights and techniques I've honed through years of photographing birds in flight.



While my focus is on avian subjects, the principles and strategies I'll discuss are universally applicable across all forms of action photography, from sports and dance to diverse wildlife scenarios.





## **The Primitive Brain**

Our brains remain primitive. I know mine is. I prefer simple to complex in decision making, procedures and virtually everything I do. I loathe going to a new restaurant and being presented with a multiple page menu. First off, I am suspicious of any restaurant that proclaims it can make all items on the menu with equal perfection. But my primary issue is having to go through all of the choices while I and my dinner mates studiously and silently inspect the menu. I have become a fan of those restaurants that offer daily specials and I often opt out of the entire "homework" phase of dining out and simply ask the server "what would you get?"

Unfortunately I don't have that wait staff person standing by to make decisions for me regarding capturing and processing images. I have been labeled a computer nerd by my wife and most of my friends. I guess I deserve the label but the truth is I am far from the true nerd. My "computerese" comes from trying to find the simplest and easiest way of getting the job done. It took me at least a year to actually understand Adobe's Lightroom. I couldn't find anyone who could explain how the catalog really worked. Telling me that my physical files are there but LR uses a virtual copy just didn't work for me. I needed a non-technical person to provide the metaphor of how a public library is actually what LR is doing electronically for my primitive brain "to get it".

Computers or at least computer components presented the same dilemma. Once computers were boiled down to their primary components I got it. In fact I built several computers and still enjoy messing with the hardware. They are far simpler and less messy than building an automobile engine (something I can do in my sleep).

This brings me to my love hate relationship with the latest camera marvel the mirrorless camera. My simple brain loves eliminating mirrors, prisms and mechanical shutters but I hate multi page menus (see paragraph #1). Multi-function buttons are loved by the technically adroit but for me they are a way to get hopelessly lost in an electronic maize. Apparently camera manufacturing artisans were displaced by software engineers and they don't seem to have any restrictions on what they do. I doubt there is any one person who knows what every single command and feature does on a camera.

I confess there is a lot of stuff on a camera that I know out of necessity but I don't love it. My Sony has real control knobs for most of my regular needs and that makes my primitive brain happy. I have mind boggling autofocus with a multitude of options that I rarely use. I have it set to what works and leave it at that. I also use aperture priority for 98% of what I shoot. It works so why complicate things.

In my opinion photography is all about finding ways to simplify using your gear so you can concentrate on the important aspects of your shot like composition and light. The next great camera isn't going to make you the next great photographer but simplifying your process so your primitive brain is happier just might get you there...
